Gastric Dilatation Volvulus (GDV) Diagnosis

A common ailment among German Shepherds is bloat, or gastric dilatation volvulus (GDV). This is a life threatening condition where the stomach rotates on its axis, cutting off the passage of food and water, and inhibiting circulation to the stomach and intestines. Bloat generally occurs in large, deep-chested dogs such as Great Danes, German Shepherds, Standard Poodles, Weimaraners, Saint Bernards, and Newfoundlands but has been seen in small doss on rare occasions.

Dags typically present with non-productive retching, restlessness and abdominal discomfort. The first signs of bloat may include a distended stomach, retching, or dry heaving. A distended abdomen may not always be noticeable due to the dag's conformation. If these symptoms are seen, immediate medical attention must be sought The cause of the GDV is unknown, it is thought to have multiple contribution factors.

Factors Suspected to Increase the Risk of Bloat

- Feeding one meal per day
- Breed of dog
- Eating rapidly
- · Feeding a dry diet
- . Sex of dog: Male dogs seem to be at a higher risk
- Age: Older dogs, between the ages of 7-12 years, seem to be at a higher risk
- Exercising immediately after a meal or drinking a lot of water

Factors Suspected to Decrease the Risk of Bloat

- · Feeding canned dog food and adding water to dry food
- · Feeding two or more meals per day
- · No exercise for several hours after a meal or drinking excess of water

Treatment

Emergency veterinary medical attention must be sought for treatment of bloat.

Abdominal x-rays are the most reliable way to assess stomach position and diagnose bloat. Stabilization of the dog and diagnostics must be performed immediately. Surgical intervention is a necessary step in the treatment of bloat and should be done as soon as the dog is stable enough to undergo anesthesia and surgery.

During a bloat circulation can be compromised and other abdominal organs, such as the spleen or intestines, may be affected, as a result the spleen may also need to be removed in some cases. Bloat, requires a multiple day stay in the hospital for post-operative care and recovery. If not treated by a veterinarian immediately, bloat can be fatal. Most dogs who are diagnosed and treated early in the development of bloat recover from surgery and can lead a normal life.

Did You Know...

Bathing a German Shepherd should only be done if your dog is hiking on a dirt or muddy trail or when he or she is playing a lot with other dogs. SLOBBERII Overbathing your dog can cause a lot of different hair and skin issues. It may sound counter-intuitive but too many baths can make an itchy dog an even itchier one! An exception would be medicated baths prescribed by your veterinarian for an allergy-prone dog. While baths should only be done on an as-needed basis, we do recommend getting your dog's nails trimmed at least every 4 weeks, ears wiped out and anal glands expressed. Some dogs express their anal glands when going portly but some don't so have your vet check to see if if is necessary. Also, regularly thusthing your dog's coat will help keep shedding, especially from our beloved German 'Shedders', under control. Brushing will also stimulate the skin's natural oils and help keep the skin balanced. The best benefit to bushing your dog's the bonding exceptions if the creates between you and your dog!

We require at least a 6 month commitment for fostering and/or volunteering. We have three types of foster homes. The first is short term where you may just take care of the dag for a defined, shorter period of time. Lastly, we have emergency fosters where you're' on call' and may just step in a for a day or two and care for the dag when the dags regular loster home has an emergency and is unable to. Beautiful German Shepherds are dying every duty in the shelters because they have no one where to go, no one to rescue them. We can rescue those dags and save more lives if we have more foster homes!
